# Welcome back!



On 4 January 1960 the doors to Ryefield Avenue Primary Infant and Junior School opened to welcome the school's first cohort.

Mrs E Rees, the Infant School Headteacher, wrote: 'at 08.50 the school opened with a roll of 153 children. The staff were allocated as follows:

Class 1 Mrs M Roat  
Class 2 Mrs M Phillips  
Class 3 Miss J Brittain  
Class 4 Mrs N Burfield (supply teacher)

*The school was visited during the afternoon during the afternoon by Mrs Sabin, the borough Education Officer.'*

During this week's assembly the children were asked to think of the difference between life in 2020 and life during the 1960's. They were surprised to learn the following:

- The average cost of a house in 1960 was £2189 - equivalent to £45 969 today
- The average annual salary in 1960 was £545 - equivalent to £11 446 today
- The average cost of a car in 1960 was £800- equivalent to £16 800 today
- The average cost of a litre of petrol in 1960 was £0.05- equivalent to £1.07 today

Over the coming months we will be celebrating our anniversary in a variety of ways:

The will include every child being presented with a commemorative enamel pin badge, a community day involving rocket building and creative arts, a visit from a poet to write a school poem, a commemorative display to sited at the front of the school, and an open school for ex pupils and staff (this will coincide with the FoR Party in the Playground).

As you know, Ryefield places a strong emphasis on oracy and discussion. Here is a **talking point** to be discussed at home. Why not raise it at the dinner table, or whilst on a drive over the weekend?

### **Can animals provide the same support to us as our friends?**



Question: How can animals help us?

Listen, think, share

- Record a list of animals. Which animals do people often keep as pets? Do you have any animals in your home? Where might you find or see some of the other animals recorded in your list?
- Look at pictures which shows how animals help people. Do you think animals should be used to help people in this way?
- Focus on a guide dog. Think about what it might be like for someone who cannot see to live without a guide dog. Do you think they could still go to the shops on their own?
- Explain that all of the animals on the resource are trained to carry out their tasks or jobs. Can you think of any other examples of when you have seen animals trained? Were they trained for a job or entertainment?
- Think about some of the pets or animals we might have at home. How might they help someone? Explain that often our pets can help to make us feel calm or happy, they can also provide companionship – they are like another friend!

*Reflection*

Animals can be trained to carry out specific jobs, which can help make things easier for people. It is important that these animals are all cared for and looked after properly.

# Responsible use of technology in the HOME

The school continues to deal with issues of unkind behaviour which occurred **out of school hours, at the family home - on social media or gaming platforms**. We STRONGLY URGE **all** parents who have given their children mobile devices or access to PSN or XBOX LIVE to monitor their conduct and behaviour.
