Name: Home- start Hillingdon

Summary:

Home-Start Hillingdon supports families who live in the London Borough of Hillingdon.

Being a parent, whatever your situation, can be incredibly challenging, especially when children are young. Many parents feel exhausted and overwhelmed by the stresses of family life. For some parents it's a particular struggle because they are also coping with issues such as post-natal depression, their or their child's illness or disability, isolation, or multiple births.



Key Points:

Home-Start Hillingdon recruits and trains local volunteers and carefully matches a volunteer to visit a family in their own home for a couple of hours a week. All the families we support must have at least one child under five.





Summary

Young carers are children and young people, aged 5 – 24 years, who provide regular and ongoing care to a family member who has a long-term illness, disability, mental health issue or misuses substances. The family member may be a parent, sibling or grandparent living with them.

Caring responsibilities can have a significant impact on young people and can affect their physical and mental health, education and social opportunities. Hillingdon Carers has been supporting young carers since 2001.

We aim to mitigate the impact of caring on young people through the provision of emotional support, school liaison, information and advice and regular social activities. We also work in partnership with local organisations and schools to identify young carers and raise awareness of their needs.

Name: Mermaids

Summary

Mermaids aims to inform and support families of children and young people who question their gender and express it differently. We understand the emotions involved in supporting a gender-variant child, and the confusion over where to turn for help. We offer families the benefit of our experience in dealing with transgender issues, and provide access to the support and knowledge of others in similar situations.



Key Points

Young children enjoy role-play and dressing-up during childhood, this exploration is normal and healthy. Exploring different roles helps children learn about the world, relate to other people and understand themselves better. For some children this exploration goes further, and they question the gender they have been born into and the expectations this places on them. As a parent or carer it can be worrying and confusing when a child prefers playing with toys associated with the opposite gender or dressing in the other gender's clothes. Some children may request the use of a different name or insist that they aren't a boy/girl but the opposite.

There are an estimated 86,625* children in England with life-limiting or life-threatening conditions. This number has trebled over the last 17 years and is rising. Thousands of families have to face the very real possibility that their child may die and struggle to cope on a day to day basis. Our Family Support Workers provide a lifeline to these families and children.

When a child has a serious illness, family life is turned upside down and time becomes more precious than ever. Key Points

Summary

SANE was established in 1986 to improve the quality of life for people affected by mental illness, following the overwhelming public response to a series of articles published in The Times entitled The Forgotten Illness.

Written by the charity's founder and chief executive, <u>Marjorie Wallace</u>, the articles exposed the neglect of people suffering from mental illness and the poverty of services and information for individuals and families.

SANE's vision has remained consistent throughout its history: to raise public awareness; excite research; and bring more effective professional treatment and compassionate care to everyone affected by mental illness.



Key Points

SANE is a UK-wide charity working to improve quality of life for people affected by mental illness. SANE has three main objectives linked to our aims and outcomes:

- To raise awareness and combat stigma about mental illness, educating and fighting to improve mental health services.
- To provide care and emotional support for people with mental health problems, their families and carers as well as information for other organisations and the public.
- To promote and host research into the causes and more effective treatments of mental illness such as schizophrenia and depression and the psychological and social impact of mental illness.
